Introduction

2024 Open Source Software Funding Survey

This survey is a collaboration between GitHub, Inc., the Linux Foundation, and researchers from Harvard University.

What is the purpose of this survey?

- Our objective is to better understand how organizations fund, contribute to, and support open source software projects.
- The primary audience for this survey are OSPOs, Heads of Engineering and Product, C-Level Executives, and other individuals with a solid understanding of their organization's open source engagement.

What can I expect if I take part?

- To participate, you must be 18 years old or older.
- We expect the survey to take about 15 to 20 minutes.
- The survey contains multiple choice and text-entry questions.
- The survey may contain some questions for which you simply do not have enough information to answer. It is OK to choose 'Don't know' as a response to these questions.
- If you decide you do not want to provide an answer to a question, you may leave

the question blank.

 If you decide you do not want to continue, you may leave the survey at any point and your data will not be saved.

How will my privacy be protected?

- The survey will never ask for or record your name or email address.
- Survey data will be analyzed by exclusively researchers from the Laboratory for Innovation Science at Harvard (LISH). Results of this analysis will only ever be disseminated as statistical aggregates and at no point will any effort be made to link survey respondents to personal identities or their affiliated organization.




